# Report to the Congregation The Rev. Katie Kandarian-Morris

#### Dear Ones,

I write, nearing the end of my first year serving as your called minister. The two years prior, my role was that of "Developmental Minister" contracted to be with you to focus on particular goals to move the congregation forward. Now, after one year, I believe we work pretty well together, and it has been a year that has proved to be growing and thriving.

What seems most significant this year, is that the nation has new leadership, and despite differences we share in the congregation, the new administration has proved to serve as a rallying cry for our liberal teligious values and our dedication to social justice. It has nudged people in the community to make their way to our doors, with membership numbers growing closer to 150 adult members, and attendance figures on some Sundays climbing well over that mark. Faster Sunday we served just shy of 200 people at two services.

Our Faith Formation program is growing and where we previously held mostly a "one-room schoolhouse" now we have childcare, nursery, pre-school/early elementary, and elementary. Our fledgling youth group now has 8 teens registered. The exciting acquisition of the next-door property will provide more appropriate and spacious classroom space for this important population of Unitarian Universalists.

This year we lost important members Don Hayes and Don Gordon. We remembered Don Hayes at a memorial in April and will remember Don Gordon in June. We're fortunate that both Judy Hayes and Sharon Gordon will remain active in our fellowship.

Milestone events at UUI-D this year included

- The first installation ceremony for your called minister, where guest ministers came
  from California and Denver area to participate. A fabulous reception was organized
  following and I think we can be proud of the continued breaking-through of the
  congregation.
- Frolic, our repeating, successful auction.
- Standing on the Side of Love March, where on a super-snowy day, 1000 people showed up and UUFD took the lead.
- Snowdown Parade included a joy-filled, kid-filled UUFD float.
- Continuation of our successful recital series
- First year participation in community Advent and Lenten services that welcomed
  other denominations to worship with us, and to share fellowship.

As we continue this journey together, I am honored and grateful to be serving this wise and wonderful congregation.

#### Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Durango Board of Trustees President's Annual Report July 2016-May 2017 Teresa Jordan

You know that church life is all about relationships.

And because you know this, your spiritual discipline of forgiveness is always at hand.

The Board of Trustees of the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Durango (UUFD) met on the second Tuesday of each month to attend to the business of the congregation, which is fundamentally to grow the beloved community. In late summer, Board members participated in a day-long retreat to consider what we were being called to do and how we would be with each other. We began to develop a common understanding of roles, outlined the Board action plan for the church year, and began thinking about the strategic planning process. In addition, members of the Board participated in monthly 'Deep Chair' discussions to explore our vision for UUFD, and the Board met quarterly with the Leadership Council, which includes the Minister, the Board, committee chairs, and ministry team leaders.

Early in the year, the Board focused its attention on foundational documents by re-writing the Board Covenant and reviewing articles on mission statements. The Board identified a need for the congregation to re-visit the existing UUFD mission statement and to develop a congregational covenant. The Board charged a Strategic Planning Task Force, which included **Ken Carpenter**, **Judy Hayes, Chris Lopez, Tom Miller, Terri Reherman, Aline Schwob, Melissa Stacy**, and **Portia Sykes**, and hired a consultant, the Rev. Dr. Lawrence Peers, to work with the task force and facilitate a discernment process with the congregation to identify common goals. Thanks to all who participated in The Summit and Action Planning. (See Vice President Tom Miller's Annual Report for more on the strategic planning process.)

To define the lines of responsibility and accountability within the congregation, your Board continued to develop policy governance at UUFD this past year by:

- completing a group-study of Governance and Ministry: Rethinking Board Leadership by Dan Hotchkiss;
- sharing the UUFD Governance/Leadership Model with committee chairs and ministry team leaders;
- charging a Policy Task Force, which included Bonnie Miller, Graham Smith, and me, to draft a set of board policies; and
- reviewing and providing comments to the task force to revise those draft policies.

The Board expects to approve a final version of the policies by June or July 2017.

In fulfilling its fiduciary role, the Board closely monitored UUFD's financial condition by:

- reviewing monthly and quarterly financial reports;
- studying the pros and cons of retiring UUFD's mortgage;
- charging an Endowment Task Force (Ken Carpenter, the late Don Hayes, Tim Miller, and Tom Miller) to research, develop, and recommend to the Board an endowment plan for UUFD;
- charging a Financial Review Task Force (Syl Allred, Jack Eberhart, Tim Miller, Steve Ruddell, and Mark Swanson) to examine UUFD financial practices;

- approving FROLIC Co-Chairs Lynn Griffith, Connie Jacobs, and Bonnie Miller who
  organized and coordinated the successful auction fundraising event, with proceeds to go
  toward fees for consultants and architectural concept designs;
- establishing a mechanism for electronic giving though the our newly designed UUFD website with the efforts of the IT Team (Ed Cox, Eb Redford, John Schiffel, and Graham Smith) and Finance Committee Chair Tim Miller:
- assisting the Stewardship Committee Co-Chairs Kathleen Adams and Lisa Govreau with a successful pledge campaign that will allow for some of our campus expansion and additional staff hours for more programming;
- applying for and receiving the UUA Mountain Desert District Chalice Lighter Grant to install
  a vertical lift to the second floor above Bowman Hall;
- proposing and developing two new staff positions Financial Clerk and Membership Professional; and
- working with Finance Committee Chair Tim Miller to develop the FY18 Proposed Budget.

This past year your Board promoted leadership development within our congregation by:

- approving financial support to Leadership Development/Nominating Committee Chair Allison Andersen and committee member Maureen Maliszewski to attend the Russell Lockwood Leadership School;
- providing trainings at quarterly meetings of Leadership Council;
- approving financial support for Elizabeth Long and Associate Treasurer K Redford to attend UUA General Assembly as delegates for UUFD.

Your Board sought to accommodate our growing congregation by:

- monitoring monthly attendance reports generated by the Membership Committee, chaired by Carolyn Miller;
- conducting a fundraising campaign to purchase ten additional chairs for the sanctuary;
- voting to move offices and volunteers' work space into the second floor above Bowman
  Hall when our tenants' lease expires this summer (In addition to creating a more functional
  work environment for staff and volunteers, this move will free-up space adjacent to the
  sanctuary for the preschool children's Faith Formation.);
- beginning to explore going to two services each Sunday;
- proposing a formal agreement with Durango 9-R School District for over-flow parking from UUFD at Needham Elementary School;
- working out details of moving elementary school-aged children, youth, and adult Faith Formation activities into neighboring property on Columbine Drive;
- planning to charge a Campus Planning Task Force, which will assess our long-term building needs and propose possible solutions; and
- planning to charge a Capital Campaign Task Force, which will propose and implement a fundraising campaign to support the campus plan.

As I conclude my service on the Board, I want to thank the congregation for all the support you have shown me. I am especially grateful to **Rev**. **Katie** for the counsel and wisdom she has shared. No one does this sacred work in isolation. Any success I experienced in Board service is credited to the caring and sharing members of our beloved community. I alone bear responsibility for my shortcomings; and for those, I ask your forgiveness – just as I forgive myself. Thank you for the honor of serving on your Board of Trustees.

# Board of Trustees Vice-President's Annual Report May 2017 Tom Miller

Since I have become a member of UUFD, my observation is that each successive Board has crafted their priorities and action, consciously building on the committed and excellent work of their predecessors. We have done a lot of growing over the last several years, thanks to the dedicated efforts of many members and friends. As we look at the accomplishments of the current outgoing Board (see Teresa Jordan's President's report) we can, again, see much forward movement. To continue that progress, in addition to "keeping the lights on", I believe the incoming Board will have four key areas of growth and change to manage: revisit our mission, finish the strategic planning process, start seriously planning for a campus renewal and begin a capital campaign to fund it, and continue to grow into our new governance structure.

#### Mission

UUFD's mission statement was crafted years ago in a time of lay leadership. We are about to start our fourth year in our partnership with Rev. Katie, whose presence has brought many positive changes to the fife of our Fellowship. We have many new members who bring in additional life, perspective and experience. As we consider all the potential changes that were raised in the strategic planning process it seems appropriate that we now take some time to consider whether the "old" mission fully represents the sense and hopes of our current membership for how we want UUFD to be in the world.

#### Strategic Planning

Perhaps the most immediate task is to continue the Strategic Planning process to the point that we have a complete document that expresses the best ambitions of the Fellowship. As I write this, there are still steps in the process that need to be completed. First, a deep dive review by the current Board of the draft presented by the Strategic Planning Steering Committee at the May 9 Board meeting. That document, the work of over 50 or our members, took the cumulative work of the Summit and condensed it into twelve goal areas with associated objectives and tasks to be completed. The Board will review these goal areas with an eye to settling on those which are not only most important to delivering on our mission, but clearly doable within a 3-5 year time frame, given the resources we have. The Board is likely to request additional input from current committees, task forces, Ministry teams and programs as that refinement takes place. The incoming Board will be tasked with beginning the implementation phase of the completed plan.

#### Campus Needs Review and Capital Campaign

It is clear already, based both on the work of the Summit and the following deliberations by the Action Planning groups, that a very key part of the Strategic Plan will be a comprehensive effort to review and possibly redefine the physical spaces we have and how we will use them. The addition of the Columbine House and the upstairs of Bowman give us potential to handle, at least in the short term, some of the growth that we are experiencing. These additions to our physical capacity, however, do nothing for the crowding we experience in the Sanctuary and our fellowship space in Bowman Hall. A number of options have been part of informal dialog over the last few months. Whatever changes we ultimately decide on will affect us all. It will therefore require a thorough, deliberate period of dialog and discernment before we settle on one final approach to bring forward to the Fellowship. The obvious implication, if we decide to redesign and/or renovate our physical facilities, is that we will need to initiate a capital campaign to fund those improvements.

#### Governance Model

Over the last few years, the Board has also been building their work upon the Dan Hotchkiss' policy-based governance model. The model is a method organizing the work of the different groups within the Fellowship to define clear lines of responsibility and accountability. As we continue to grow and our need for organization and coordination increases in complexity, this work serves to make the work of the Board both more effective and efficient as we seek to implement our mission. Each year we get better at it and the incoming Board will continue to grow into that practice across all the activities of the Fellowship.

While the Board has the responsibility of representing and guiding the Fellowship to accomplish its mission, the real work of the Fellowship is done by all of you. The four key areas noted above (Mission review, Strategic Plan implementation, Campus planning and Capital Campaign, and Governance progress) are the headlines and suggest changes in what we look like and how we present ourselves to the outside community. This amount of potential change is both exciting and challenging and should be driven by a clear and consensus sense of our mission. The incoming Board will be responsible for managing the changes in a way that balances our hopes and ambitions with our ability to deliver. A big part of that will be the willingness of the membership to participate in the work of the various committees, task forces, ministry teams and programs, as well as the opportunities to weigh in on the deliberations of what those changes should actually be. We hope you will join in as actively as you can.

#### Adult Faith Formation

A Faith Formation team formed this year. It has four congregants, the director and the minister, and meets quarterly.

UUFD currently maintains three covenant groups. Starting in Fall 2017, there will be a Covenenat Group Facilitator Coordinator.

Healing Racism Circle continues to meet quarterly and attend community events.

Multiple Adult Faith Formation series, curricula, workshops and films are offered to the young adult and adult community throughout the year. These are lead by the minister, lay leaders and outside guests.

UUFD is proud to offer a variety of special interest and spiritual practice groups for theological deepending, personal growth and social connection. Offerings include but are not limited to Recital Series, poetry circle, common reads, community service, Game Night, Covenant of Unitarian Universalist Pagans (CUUPS), yoga, meditation, Outdoor Adventure Group, Sage Circle, Circle Suppers, PFŁAG, Transgender Group, 4 STAR support group, League of Women Voters, AAUW.

Childcare is available upon request during adult faith formation offerings.

#### Children's Faith Formation

UUFD is proud to serve over 40 Four Corners area families, including over 80 children age three months to 18 years. Children's and youth ministry regularly welcomes 20-40 children. People have lots to do and continue to show up when they are able. Families are all juggling the dynamics of modern life and parenting. It is an honor to welcome these amazing families and children every Sunday. 2016 goal of 25% increase in families and children was met.

There are four classrooms for children and youth at UUFD: Nursery/childcare (0-3years), Pre-K-1st Grade (4-7yrs), 2nd-5th Grade (8-11 yrs), Youth Group for middle/high school (12-18 yrs).

A Children's Faith Formation insert was added to the Worship bulletins to inform people about children's curriuda.

A Faith Formation team formed this year. It has four congregation members, the director and the minister, and meets quarterly.

Teacher Recruitment recruitment is a challenge. Nominations are being used for teachers. The goal is to have recurring lead teachers for each age group with rotating assistants. 15-20 lead teachers is ideal.

#### Social Responsibility and Justice Program 2016-17 Annual Report Summary

SRJ Program Coordinators: Bonnie Miller, Betty Schwartz-Bozeman, Charlie Clements

The Social Responsibility and Justice Program is in its third year as a new design for working toward our UUFD mission for social justice. Our efforts this year focused on continuing to refine and improve the program model and increase the communication and connection of the program to the Fellowship at large so that we may more effectively achieve our mission for social justice: work toward a community with peace, liberty and justice for all.

This is the second year for three of the social justice teams: Basic Needs, LGBTQ, and Healing Racism. A fourth team, Immigration, was added midyear due to increased concerns in this area and an interested group of volunteers.

#### Team Highlights:

<u>Basic Needs</u> – Volunteers continued to focus on food insecurity through service each month at Manna Kitchen, in addition to serving with Thrive La Plata County Coalition for a Living Wage, and Love Out Loud community service projects.

<u>LGBTQ</u> – Advocacy for the 4 Corners Rainbow Youth Center continued as a team priority, with a focus on education (Transgender 101 workshop), providing volunteer support, use of our facilities, participation in Pride Week, and fundraising.

<u>Healing Racism</u> – The team held a community-wide film (*White Like Me*) and workshop (*White Identity*), co-sponsored the Diversity Dialogue with FLC, participated in the UUA common read book, attended Indigenous Peoples Day, Las Cafeterias concert, held a White Supremacy teach-in, and hung a Human Rights banner on the front of the church.

<u>Immigration</u> – A working relationship was established with Compañeros, the Four Corners Immigrant Resource Center, advocacy training sessions were conducted, we signed on to become an emergency base operations, and information documents were researched and created for distribution at UUFD.

#### Additional sponsored events and activities:

The SRJ program engaged in and sponsored numerous community events including, films "Pride," "Witness to War" and "Defying the Nazis: the Sharps' War," Michael Dowd on ecology as theology, RESPOND, Standing on the Side of Love march, Snowdown float, Women's March presentation, and People's Climate march. Each Sunday the SRJ table provides information, educational materials and SOTSOL apparel; Equal Exchange products are offered for purchase; petitions and support letters are available for signatures.

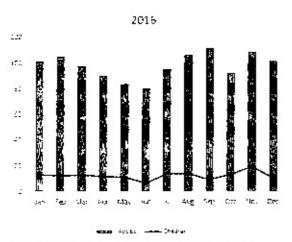

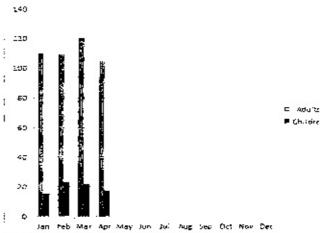

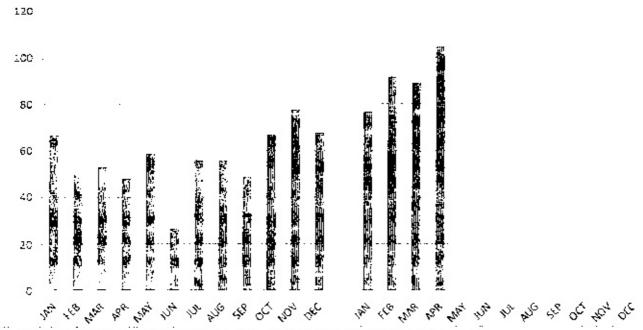


UUSD Moetely Average Service Asterbanch. Jamesty-Tracember 2016

Caring Team report for 2016-17

Team Leader: Liza Tregillus

Activities for the year: The Caring Team meets monthly, and the standard agenda is review and coordination of caring needs of members and friends, followed by discussion of other business. The group regularly sends cards, makes visits to members at home or the hospital, sets up meal trees or other support systems (e.g. rides) on an ongoing basis, and updates at the meetings or by email. The Caring meetings and all communication follow confidentiality guidelines.

Current members include: Ken Carpenter, Burt Coleman, Liza Tregillus, Susan Koonce, JJ Jennings, Dave Rich, Marye Jackson, Susan DeCloedt and newest members Lynn Griffith and Sue Eberhart. At our June meeting we will be asking members to decide if they will continue with the committee for the coming year.

This year the following items were accomplished:

- Development of Lay Pastoral Associates: a process of identifying interested members led to a training of three pastoral associates to increase ministry capacity of the congregation. The three trained Associates, Susan Koonce, Burt Coleman and Liza Tregillus, were then presented to the congregation in a Commissioning Ceremony. A survey of the congregation to identify need for help or willingness to give help was also completed, as a further measure to "beef up" our caring capacity.
- 2) The Caring Team reviews local resource information annually; we have copies of the Senior Center resource guide, and members of the Team share information regularly about new services, organizations or other information that may be important to share with members.
- 3) The group periodically discusses ways to address congregation needs beyond individual support. This may be as simple as organizing boxes of Kleenex to be available, to discussing potential future systems of support for parents of young children or aging members.
